Interaction: ask questions; participate naturally in a conversation or discussion; job interviews; debates or work groups; argue for and against; emailing.

Speaking: tell, describe, summarize information from various sources; oral presentations with graphs and charts; rephrasing; argue for and against.

Writing: answer questions in a coherent and structured manner; class essays; take notes; formal and informal correspondence.
